

Your project will help you visually organize the plot, the literary techniques, and a theme from *Waiting for Godot*.

Using 12x18 inch sheets of white construction paper, markers, colored pencils, or whatever other art supplies you choose, we will embark upon our journey with Didi and Gogo. (*We live in a techie world, so if you want to make this using technology...go for it! Just don't use ppt. Use an online something, so we can all access it.*) Be creative!

First, take that **12x18** sheet of white paper (or your techie something) and fold it into four equal folds. The first fold will be your title page. It should be original and include relevant images and colors and the title, author, and a hook to gain the reader's attention. Your name should be included at the bottom of the page.

I have divided the book into sections for the folds. Everything in your project must relate back to the THEME that was assigned to you. For example, if your theme is *love that never changes*, all your work, pictures, ideas, etc will relate to that theme (see my *Wuthering Heights* accordion book for an example).

For Fold 1 – Title, theme, hook, and your name
 For Fold 2—Vladimir/ Didi
 For Fold 3— Estragon/ Gogo
 For Fold 4— Pozzo
 For Fold 5— Lucky
 For Fold 6— Godot
 For Fold 7— allusions
 For fold 8 – symbols / themes (depends on topic)

Use one picture per fold
 Use ink/ ink for text
 Use correct grammar, spelling, and conventions
 Use formal diction
 Be amazing
 Include analysis
 At least three woven quotes per panel
 Include literary elements

For each section of the play, create a story panel that includes a sketch or picture or one visual image that is important to the plot (symbol, place, character, etc.) with colors that remind you of the mood, setting, or characters important to that section of the plot; a title to that particular section (stage of the story); and your writing about the segment (your reflections about the issues presented, or the person who most influenced the events in this section, or how characters changed to meet the challenge of these events and influences) AND use quotes and literary elements from this section of the story that captures the your theme. DO NOT SUMMARIZE THE PLOT!!

You are not getting out of the work load required of book cards. You are transposing that information to a project. All the information included on the book card sheet MUST be included in your accordion project somehow. The amount of information you learn has not changed, only the presentation of the learning. However, we are dividing the work of the themes, so therefore, as a class we are splitting the work load.
