- 2. Beowulf said "Fate will unwind as it must." How do these words reflect the Anglo-Saxon attitude toward fate?
- 3. Explain briefly how the mead hall was considered a home for Anglo-Saxon warriors. In your answer examine the role the mead hall plays in *Beowulf* or "The Wanderer."
- 4. Explain why although the ancient Angles and Saxons were pagans, influences of Christianity may be found in Beowulf. Give specific examples.
- 5. Explain why Anglo-Saxons such as Beowulf were anxious to gain fame and to be remembered for their exploits.
- 6. What were Coifi's reasons for advising his king to convert. Your answer must include the allegory.
- Contrast Herot with Grendel's lair. Include the symbolism of both dwellings.
- 8. Prove using specific examples that *Beowulf* is an epic hero. Include the definition of epic, the traits of epics, and examples of each trait.
