A one-pager is a written and graphic interpretation of what you have just read presented on a single sheet of paper. It may be literal (based strictly on the facts presented) or it may be a symbolic representation of the piece. The one-pager helps visualize what you are reading.

Guidelines:

- Use standard (8 ½ x 11) unlined paper (computer/printer paper)
- Include your first and last name on the back of the one pager
- Fill the entire page – no negative space should be left
- Written work must be in ink or typed
- Use markers/colored pencils for illustrations – no computer illustrations
- Include all of the following – arrange on the page any way you choose
 - Title of Work, Author, Chapter or Section
 - Characters - List of characters from the novel
 - Setting - Description of where and when the novel took place
 - Conflict/ Conflicts – explain it in detail
 - **Three** or more excerpts (quotations) from the reading (passages you like or think are especially important) include the page numbers, put quote in quotation marks,
 - A personal in-depth response to each passage selected (an interpretation/explanation of its significance – answer “*Why did I choose this excerpt?*” and “*Why is it significant to the literature?*”
 - In depth means the response includes specific details that go above and beyond the mediocre. Make me believe you read every word of the novel.
 - **Three** or more graphics or symbols which relates to the passages selected – hand drawn, color, creative, neat, balanced, eye-appealing
 - **Use correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation**
